



# STATION FOR UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The University of Minnesota, pioneer of 1920 in broadcasting as WLB, is likely to have its operation restored by state appropriation for a \$15,000 station and \$10,000 a year for two years to operate it. A bill has been introduced in the legislature. It will furnish crop and agricultural reports, livestock and grain quotations and also educational features and entertainment.

#### MUST STUDY SPANISH NOW

Argentina's high power wireless station is to be on the air in June. The station is at Monte Grande, near Buenos Aires, the first South American station in the international commercial radio system. The control lines will be conduited 24 kilometers into the city. This station is expected to be powerful enough to overcome one of the two static dead centers, which are near the equator off Brazil, and in the south Atlantic.




