




It Started Modestly . . .


... and grew fantastically

The German V-1 bombs made the celler of BBC untenable so AFN moved to a British nobleman's mansion at 80 Portland Place, London. Moving to the continent shortly after D-Day they followed the troops until war's end where the final home for the network occupies the 14th century Von Bruening Castle. (left) The "Schloss" was built in 1357, destroyed three times by the citizens of Frankfurt, and is now the billeting and studio area for the enlisted staff.

Sports








Local Glamor






For the Staff


