FRIML GUEST ON MOBILOIL

Noted Composer at Piano on Wednesday

New York, Nov. 21.—Rudolph Friml, composer, who has brought millions to theatres in America and Europe to hear his operettas, "The Vagabond King," "The Three Musketeers," "Rose Marie," "The Firefly," and other successes, will be presented on the Mobiloil concert, Wednesday, November 25. KSTP will present this program at 7:30 P. M.

The Mobiloil concert will present the world-popular musician, who rarely plays for the radio, as guest pianist, playing some of his own compositions, in an all-Friml program as Mobiloil's Thanksgiving gift to the radio public.

Soloists on Program

With him will appear Gladys Rice, soprano, and Douglas Stanbury, baritone, who will sing some of the public's favorite Friml tunes.

Mr. Friml's tremendous fame as a composer has overshadowed his earlier stature as a concert pianist, but before he ever wrote a musical show he had established his reputation as a musician.

He came to this country from his native Bohemia, as accompanist to Jan Kubelik, the violinist, liked it so well here, that he stayed and within a few years, had made his place as a pianist by several successful tours, and had begun to compose the musical dramas with which he has been delighting the world ever since.

Friml to Play Piano

Wednesday's program will be made up of Mr. Friml's own favorites among his compositions. His first piano selection will be the "Indian Love Call," from "Rose Marie," which he will play in his original arrangement. Later, he will play the "Valse Hugnette" as part of a presentation of favorite songs from "The Vagabond King."

The orchestra, under Nathaniel Shildret, will play Mr. Friml's new "Arabian Suite, Part Three," inspired by a trip the composer took to Arabia, which had its world radio premiere during a recent Mobiloil concert. Other Friml numbers will be included on the program.

He started in radio many years ago as a soloist, using his bass voice to good advantage on a stage tour.

Frank arranged a novel vaudeville act, using his experience at announcing and toured leading theatres of the country "singing as he went."

Native of Plainview

Austin is a native of Plainview, Minn., and after his preliminary education in the grade schools there his folks moved to Denver, where he received his high school training.

It was then that his leaning toward military work prompted Frank's parents to send him to Wentworth Military Academy at Lexington, Mo., where he learned the fundamentals of military work and prepared himself for the role of a military man.

Joined Cavalry

Following two years of this training, he joined the First Colorado Cavalry or what was left of Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders. He was later mustered into federal service and formed a part of the 157th Infantry of the Fortieth Division at Camp Kurney, California.

Prior to entering radio, he tried various lines of endeavor, including insurance, motion picture advertising, singing, and selling musical instruments.

Frank's hobbies are hunting, fishing, horseback riding and golf. He has one great ambition in life, and that is to meet many of the listeners who have written to him. He has received fan mail from many parts of the country, Hawaii and even as far as New Zealand.

Lanny Ross will be supported in this program, in which “Watch Fires” will be featured, by the ensemble directed by Don Voorhees and the radio quartet, usually heard during this series.

Second Coolidge Poem

“Watch Fires” is the second poem by Mrs. Coolidge to be set to music by Maury Madison.

He had previously received her permission to use the words of her poem “The Quest” with his music. “Shine On Harvest Moon,” as interpreted by Don Voorhees, will be played in keeping with the Thanksgiving spirit. The quartet will sing a novelty song, “A Little Close Harmony” and “In the Silence of the Night.”

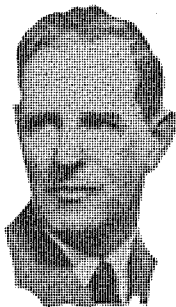
She maintains her own beauty counters in the Twin Cities; the Golden Rule Department Store in St. Paul and the Leader Department Store in Minneapolis.

An announcement of more than ordinary interest was issued a few days ago when the National Broadcasting Company informed program sponsors that it is now possible for their broadcasts, originating in the United States, to be scheduled regularly on a Honolulu station. The long gap from San Francisco to Hawaii is spanned by means of a special short wave transmitter, the Honolulu station re-broadcasting on its regular wave length.

Radio listeners in the United States are familiar with re-broadcasts because of the many European programs of entertainment and news which have been sent into their homes with increasing frequency in the past several years, but the NBC announcement tells of a step in advance with Honolulu in effect becoming an American radio city rather than a remote possession.

But we still must await as patiently as possible the day when television will enable Hawaii to send us a real picture of a grass skirt ballet at Waikiki.

A radio executive with a flair for statistics has estimated that if Americans were taxed for their radio entertainment, as in Europe, that they would pay at least twenty-five dollars a year for every set. We're afraid the "sponsors" of such a plan would lead very unhappy lives.

The Federal Radio Commission is going to give individual stations more latitude in the matter of making call letter announcements, now required at fifteen minute intervals. This will apply only to dramatic and other programs of sustained interest where the interpolation of call letters is annoying. Which reminds us (and will remind you too if you are an old time fan) of the early days of the NBC when the chain announcer would conclude each broadcast by reciting the litany of stations in the hook-up. The speed with which those glib-tongued young men named the stations probably gave Floyd Gibbons his idea.

Countess Olga Albani, soprano, will accompany the quartet and the orchestra, in presenting selections from "Oh Kay."

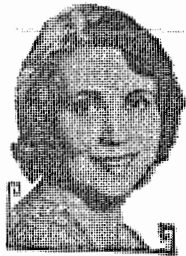

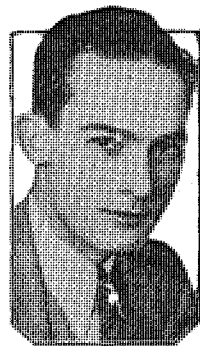

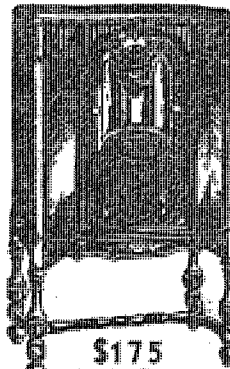
